Students Dive Into Relevant Science, Math Data, Stewardship & Service



It might look like a play period, but it was serious learning! WMS Leadership Students have decided that one of their service projects would be to try to eliminate invasive Fireweed both from campus and also along Ala 'Ohia (aka Parker

Ranch connector) Road. It is an ideal project to learn about the serious environmental threat of invasive species, practice data collection and teamwork, make a meaningful contribution to our ranching community through stewardship and also get some exercise. Ace Hardware's Waimea Store offered to donate dozens of pairs of work gloves. Pictured above accepting the gloves are (L-R) students Keighsen Walker, Holi Bergin, Nicole Lorenzo and Cody Cook. Students are learning that Fireweed, though pretty, must be taken seriously as a nasty invasive. Not only can each plant produce 30,000 seeds a year that spread easily, but it is toxic to most livestock when eaten, causing slow growth, illness, liver-malfunction and even death in severe cases. Also, it's not enough to just pull the weeds; they must be carefully sterilized -- in this case in heavy black plastic bags baked in the sun -- to ensure they aren't just spread further. Mahalo, Ace Hardware -- and to our students, faculty and staff for taking on this stewardship project that teaches so many relevant lessons!

What Will <u>You</u> Be Doing To Make A Difference On National 'Make A Difference Day' – Sat., Oct. 27?



All across the USA, the 4th Saturday of October – this year it's Oct. 27, 2012 – Americans will celebrate "Make A Difference Day."

Making a Difference involves contributing to one's "community" – that is, your immediate family, your neighborhood, your town, your island or state, or your world. And now is the time to think about what you will do to reach out and help!

WMS 8th Grade Social Studies Classes are currently studying **CITIZENSHIP** – which is directly connected to Making A Difference, so every 8th grader is being given an assignment to actively participate in a "Make A Difference Day" project. It might be one of the following suggested activities, or, students may work with their family to determine an appropriate

project to be <u>completed on Sat., Oct. 27</u>. Upon concluding the project, each student must complete a reflection form and have a family member or service recipient sign off confirming that the student did, in fact, Make A Difference by participating. This signed reflection form must be turned it in to the student's Social Studies teacher for grading.

And there's more. If a student is considering running for **May Day Court**, he/she must also attach a copy of their signed reflection to an "**Intention To Run For May Day Form.**"

The May Day Court election will not take place until January, but this gives every student the opportunity to begin working towards running for the Court.

Extra-Curricular Activities

WMS requires high academic and behavior standards for all extracurricular activities. Students must sign a contract for the particular activity and must meet the following minimum criteria beginning on the date the contract is signed:

- Maintain a 2.0 GPA;
- Have no suspensions from the time they sign the contract until the time of the activity;
- Maintain a 96% attendance rate from the time they sign the contract until the time of the activity; and
- Attend school for the full day on the day of the event.

Some extra-curricular programs/ activities may have additional requirements. These will be sent home and will require a parent/ guardian signature.

New Robotics VEX Adds 'Remote **Control' To Programming Challenge**

Our WMS Robotics Team participated in its first ever VEX competition at Honoka'a this past weekend along with 25 other Big Island teams. Hat's off to participating students, who included Roland Afaga, Quiana Anastacio, Anthony Beetem, Cleo Castillo, Easton Chong, Sadie Ednie, Maile Etherton, Dane Francis, Korie Key, Kekoa Lovell and Jeremiah Sam.

This year's VEX Challenge, called "Sack Attack," requires students to design, build, program and operate

robots to move bean bags around a 12' x 12' playing field and, in the process, score points. The game has a 15-second autonomous period and a 1- minute-45second remote control period. Teams are placed in alliances for the competition and need to strategize to earn the most points.

Our WMS team earned 231 points, putting them in 15th based on "winning points" with the highest scoring team being Hilo High School with 473 points.

Mahalo to families who came out to support the team! The next qualification events will be December 1st at Kohala and December 15th at Waiakea. Until then, our team will continue to practice to prepare for

the Pan Pacific Tournament in February on O'ahu.
