





Richmond Grows Seed Lending Library Monthly Work Party Checklist

Materials needed: Monthly Work Party Checklist, legal-sized envelopes, rag (to wet and seal envelopes), paper cutter, seed library stamp, ink pads, pencil sharpener, laptop computer with the membership list, Dye Plant stamp

At the work party:

- 1. Alphabetize seeds in collection
- 2. Add new seeds to collection please stamp any dye plants <u>before</u> filing using the "Dye Plant" stamp and the XXX colored ink pad
- 3. Add additional Membership forms to the orange Membership Binder, as needed place these forms in the front of the binde
- 4. Stock the plastic holder with seed saving brochures. These can be found in the "Supplies" drawer
- 5. Update membership list from the Membership binder:
- 6. Open up the Excel spreadsheet for membership
- 7. Get the orange Membership binder
- 8. Look for member that do <u>not</u> have a check in the upper right-hand corner.
- 9. As you enter the information, please put a check mark in the upper right-hand corner.
- 10. Seal legal sized envelopes and cut in half and stamp with seed library stamp
- 11. Sharpen pencils
- 12. Check to make sure there are the following:
 - several pencils extra stamped envelopes
 - Seed Markers <u>richmondgrows@gmail.com</u>
- 13. Time permitting, process seeds and package. If there is a large volume, make extra envelopes for sister seed libraries and place in the "Donation Sister Seed Lending Library" box located in the glass cabinet.



SEED-SHARING STATIONS

Overview

We are seeking prospective organizations/entities to adopt seed-sharing-stations, particularly locations with lots of traffic and used by people of diverse populations - e.g. community centers, libraries, churches, coffee shops, senior service centers, etc.

We will provide a Seed-Sharing-Station without charge. They are built individually to fit the specificity of each context and entirely from scrap and/or repurposed wood. Each comes with a stapler, rubber stamp/pad, pencils, a starter kit of recycled envelops and approximately 50 seed packets.

The station needs no monitoring and is self-explanatory. Anyone is welcome to take seeds and provides a place for planters to share seeds. Ideally, adoption is forever or at least a year. Adoptive organizations also agree to periodically ink the stamp pad, sharpen the pencils, restock the stapler and recycled envelops, and send EIP photos of the stations in action.

Why?

Seed-sharing is an ancient practice throughout the world. It is currently under threat by big industrial seed corporations (e.g. Monsanto). They want to patent seeds and prevent us from sharing them so we will always be forced to buy from them. Seed sharing is crucial to our freedom, autonomy from capitalism and crucial for our collective survival.

<u>Seed Sowing</u> - General information about how, when and where to sow seeds by several different methods. Explains the reasons you might want to use winter sowing, and suggests plants you can start this way. Information on stratification, scarification, and answers to more FAQs.

<u>Germination</u> - A Seed Germination Database - A table showing the results of sowing over 2000 batches of seeds of almost **1700** species, by several different methods, at different times of the year. <u>Seedling Images</u> - Photos of **800** seedlings with their Latin and common names, or sorted according to the shape of the first true leaves, with their Latin and common names, to make it easier to identify the plants that come up in your garden, or to show you what should come up from the seeds you sow. Includes some FAQs about seedlings.

<u>Database</u> - bringing together the information from the other sections, with Latin names, Plant Family, English common name, Germination information, photographs of Seedpod, Seed and Seedling, for over **600** plants.

Plant breeders who develop new vegetable varieties for organic farming systems are far and few between. The same goes for graduate students who want to go in that line of work. They can feel rather isolated—even at schools with large plant breeding programs.

After last week's Student Organic Seed Symposium, however, these distances may not feel quite so far.

For three days last week, 20 graduate students from around the nation—including five from CALS—gathered in Greensboro, Vermont to meet

The symposium, which was the first of its kind in the nation, was conceived and organized by three CALS graduate students affiliated with the plant breeding program: Claire Luby, Alex Lyon and Adrienne Shelton.

Seed Saving and Breeding for Organic Farms | August 13, 2012 – Verona Wisconsin

Learn the fundamental skills to maintain, develop, and adapt seed varieties for your organic farm at this workshop in

Verona, Wisconsin hosted by University of Wisconsin-Madison and Organic Seed Alliance.

The workshop is presented as part of the Northern Organic Vegetable Improvement Collaborative (NOVIC), a farmer-researcher participatory network working to breed and test varieties in the northern tier for organic farms. Organic plant breeding specialist Dr. John Navazio and Professor Bill Tracy will discuss such topics as: the biology of seed, on-farm seed production basics, choosing appropriate seed crops for your system and climate, maintaining the genetic integrity of varieties with appropriate population sizes and isolation distances, conducting variety trials, and basic on-farm breeding techniques such as mass selection and progeny testing. NOVIC participants from UW will share regional NOVIC efforts and trial results. This workshop will be of interest to farmers who want to improve their success with saving seed for on-farm use as well as those seeking to breed their own varieties or grow seed on a larger scale

Organic Variety Selection and Seed Saving Workshop August 16, 2012 – Lafayette Indiana

Organic vegetable farmers need varieties with more disease resistance, better ability to compete with weeds, less susceptibility to insect pests, and excellent flavor and nutritional attributes. Organic Seed Alliance, Purdue University, Washington State University, and the Carrot Improvement for Organic Agriculture (CIOA) project will host this one-day workshop at Purdue University Meig's Horticulture Research Farm in Lafayette, Indiana.
